7. CONSENT CALENDAR/ACTION AGENDA

A. CONSIDER ADJUSTING THE REGULAR MEETING SCHEDULE FROM MONTHLY TO QUARTERLY EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY.

The recent developments with SWMF's Economic Development Fund Program were discussed; the committee was still being organized. (Any loan granted would have to come back to the County Board to be voted on, otherwise information would be kept confidential.) Bank reps had been selected from PNC Bank, First National Bank of Michigan, and Consumer's Credit Union. The EDFP was explained. Hypothetical situations in which the financial representatives would have to declare conflict of interests were discussed. Mr. Artley would send Mr. Iden the EDFP policy.

Mr. Agostinelli didn't think there would be loans awarded very frequently; monthly meetings of the EDC were probably unnecessary. Mr. Woods handed out an Upjohn Institute Power Point document showing how Kalamazoo was faring in the area of employment. He then

encouraged the members to not abdicate their responsibility as a Board.

Mr. Iden raised the possible negative perception of the EDC not meeting monthly while the economy continued its recession. Ms. Rogers stated she could cover the EDC's history in more depth at a later date—she didn't see their role being expanded in the near future. She was still concerned that small businesses wouldn't be well represented in the EDFP.

A motion was made as follows:

"I move that the Kalamazoo County Economic Development Corporation regularly meet quarterly on the fourth Thursday of the month in the months of January, April, July and October. And will be posted accordingly. Special meeting may be called as needed."

This was on the strategic calendar of the County Board and would come up for discussion during the year.

9. OTHER

There was nothing reported.

10. BOARD MEMBERS COMMENTS

-Ms. Rogers echoed a previous comment by Mr. Iden, saying it was unfortunate that the EDC's role had been watered down in light of the current economic condition.

-Mr. Woods hoped that the County would recognize the benefit of working through the EDC.

-Mr. Baumgart agreed with Ms. Rogers regarding her concern for small businesses.

Re: Southwest Michigan First - *2010 Results and Plan of Work 2011 reports*

The County allocates \$75,000 a year to Southwest Michigan First (SWMF) to support economic development activities. As a part of the requirements of the contract with the County, SWMF provides some plans and feedback on how their work is affecting the county.

The *2010 Results* report lists the companies that SWMF has assisted in some capacity, and the jobs announced. It also gives a synopsis of each project. During 2010, 25 companies, or 22% of the ones that SWMF had assisted, made positive job announcements totaling 1,758 jobs that were a direct result of SWMF activities.

The *Plan of Work 2011* report discusses the success measures that will be used, target industries and strategies on how to continue their successful work in 2011. The target industries are Advance Manufacturing, Medical Device, Back Office, Research and Development Facilities and Health Sciences. The Entrepreneurial/Innovation Development focuses on Health Science. Other examples of areas to work on are connections to universities and recognizing leadership and talent.

According to the contract, these two reports prompt the payment of the second 50% of the annual allocation for 2010, and the first 50% of the 2011 annual \$75,000 allocation to SWMF.

SWMF will give a presentation to the BOC on June 21, further highlighting their activities.

Our Entrepreneurial/Innovation opportunities continue to be focused on Health Science, Medical Device and Advanced Manufacturing. Each of these sectors represents at least a 70-year legacy of growth and relevancy. Job Announcements 2010

Jobs and wealth creation is Southwest Michigan First's number one priority. In 2010, 117 companies requested our assistance with their growth needs from either within or outside of the community. Of those, 60, or 51%, became viable opportunities for job creation as they visited the community (if they were from another location) or explored expansion options (if they were from within). During 2010, 25 companies (22%) made positive job announcements totaling 1,758 jobs announced that were a direct result of our activities. Here is a summary of those announcements:

Bell's Brewery	Advanced Manufacturing/ Food	65 new	Bell's Brewery is investing more than \$50 million and adding 65 jobs in their Kalamazoo and Galesburg locations.
Benteler Automotive Group	Advanced Manufacturing/ Automotive	105 retained	The company added 30 engineers as it consolidated its engineering operations to its Galesburg location. In addition, the company received property tax abatement (P.A. 198) approval from Comstock Township, reduced utilities output to receive energy efficiency incentives from Consumers Energy, and will be making a \$13 million investment on new equipment at their Galesburg facility that will result in the retention of 75 jobs.
Grand Elk Railroad	Logistics	43 new	Grand Elk Railroad purchased the Norfolk Southern line between Grand Rapids and Elkhart, Indiana providing north/south support to all Kalamazoo businesses. It has located its headquarters at 75 Mills Street and is creating more than 40 jobs.

Jirgens Tool	Advanced Manufacturing	1 new 4 retained	One job was created and four retained in an effort to grow the company using LEAN principles.
LYNX Network Group	Other	40 new	LYNX received a \$33.3 million federal grant to fund a 955-mile fiber-optic network across Michigan as part of the REACH-3MC Collaborative. The public-private partnership will improve broadband offerings for underserved communities in Michigan. The company is constructing its remote command center in Kalamazoo and creating 40 jobs.
MANN+HUMMEL	Logistics	10 new	The Portage-based manufacturer of plastic intake-manifolds, air-filter housings and air-induction systems, added 10 new jobs and leased 67,000 square feet in Midlink Business Park.
Micro Machine Company	Medical Device	17 new	The leading manufacturer of orthopedic and spinal instruments, tools and implants, added 17 jobs as it accelerates the expansion of the company's production, marketing and sales capabilities to offer a broader product line and to serve a more diverse customer base.

Team Support Services	Other/Life Science	40 new	This life science records management company started 2010 with a small single office and one customer. It has expanded to 120,000 square feet with global operations.
