## FACT SHEET INFLUENZA

<b><i>What is Influenza?</i></b>	Influenza or “the flu” is a highly contagious viral infection of the respiratory tract (nose, throat and lungs).
<b><i>How is it spread?</i></b>	It is spread from person-to-person through droplets when an infected person coughs, sneezes, or talks. Sometimes a person can catch the flu by touching a surface (doorknob, light switch, table top, etc) where infected droplets have landed and then touching their eyes, mouth, or nose.
<b><i>What is the incubation period?</i></b>	Flu symptoms develop quickly, usually 1-4 days after a person is exposed to the flu virus.
<b><i>What are the early signs?</i></b>	Fever, headache, extreme tiredness, dry cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, and muscle aches. Small children can also have nausea, vomiting and diarrhea.
<b><i>What about contacts?</i></b>	Children who develop a fever should be sent home from school.
<b><i>How long is the person contagious?</i></b>	Influenza is contagious beginning 1 day before symptoms develop and 7 days or more after becoming sick.
<b><i>When is it OK to return to school/daycare?</i></b>	Children should not return to school or daycare until <b>at least</b> 24 hours after the fever is gone and the child is feeling well again.
<b><i>Other Important Information</i></b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Flu is often confused with the common cold, but flu symptoms tend to develop quickly and are usually more severe than the typical sneezing and congestion associated with a cold.</li> <li>• Remind children to cover their mouth and nose when they cough or sneeze, to wash their hands frequently, and to keep their hands away from their eyes and mouth.</li> <li>• Vaccination against the flu each year is the single best way to prevent influenza.</li> </ul>
