FACT SHEET PINK EYE

(Bacterial/viral/allergic conjunctivitis)

What is Pink Eye?	Pink eye is a general term for an irritation or infection of the membranes that line the eye and eyelid. There are many causes including bacteria, viruses, or allergic reactions.
How is it spread?	Infectious pink eye is spread through direct contact with discharge from the eyes and nose, and from contaminated fingers, clothing, or other articles.
What is the incubation period?	The time it takes between contact and when symptoms appear varies depending on the cause.
What are the early signs?	Irritation that causes redness and swelling of the eyelids and/or skin surrounding the eyes; sensitivity to light, eye pain; and a watery clear or yellow/green discharge from the eye may be present.
What about contacts?	Children who have come into contact with an infected person should be observed, and excluded from school only if signs of pink eye occur.
How long is the person contagious?	 Pink eye is contagious while symptoms are present. No longer contagious after 24 hours of proper treatment. Pink eye caused by an allergic reaction, chemical contact, or a condition that stimulates the immune system (i.e. Kawasaki disease) is <i>not</i> contagious and, if the child feels well, he/she need not be excluded from school.
When is it OK to return to school/childcare?	For bacterial pink eye, 24 hours after proper treatment. For herpes simplex pink eye, exclude if eye is watering. No exclusion necessary for other types of pink eye, unless 2 or more children have the same symptoms and the Health Department recommends it.
What else should I know?	 Good handwashing decreases the spread of disease. Children should be taught to practice good handwashing and other hygiene measures. Encourage children to keep their fingers away from their eyes, as infectious discharges on fingers can spread the infection from one eye to the other, and to other people.
